ism, we typically engage in an exercise where we give prospective members the oppor-

tunity to share their faith journeys. As reference points for those journeys, we generally ask how one conceptualizes a deity (e.g. theistic, atheistic, polytheistic, etc.) and whether one finds resonance with religious ritual. Many UU congregations engage in this exercise as part of their respective UU101 courses.

I remember that when I took UU101 in my home congregation back in 1993, very few of us voiced meaningful resonance with ritual. (I may have been one of those voices. I don't even remember how I responded to the exercise at the time.)

I can certainly understand such a response however. Many people come to Unitarian Universalism from other traditions where they either are simply no longer able, in good conscience, to believe in the beliefs of that tradition, or they are no longer able to connect with that tradition (e.g. values, theology, etc.) in a meaningful way.

Religious ritual can be a tool to help strengthen that connection to one's authentic faith tradition. It's not the only tool, yet it is perhaps the tool that best transcends, cuts through, short-circuits mental activity, culture and predispositions and helps us reconnect with our authentic selves, beliefs and values.

It might be natural for many newcomers to Unitarian Universalism to be suspicious of religious ritual because the rituals they've experienced are connected to a faith tradition that no longer resonates with them. That is understandable, yet we need not throw the baby out with the bathwater. As UUs, we would do well to establish rituals and traditions, as many as we can, to help us stay connected to, to be in tune with, the values that resonate with us AS UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISTS!

You've probably heard a bit about Chalica recently. (You might even read about it elsewhere in this newsletter!) Chalica is a weeklong UU holiday; a celebration of our seven principles that takes place between Dec 6 – Dec 12.

Though we will together celebrate the majority of Chalica each night via our computers, we would like to begin a new tradition of celebrating the Saturday evening Chalica (Dec 11) with an all-ages, in -person event infused with intentional ritual and celebration.

The Worship Team will be leading this event, though you will likely be asked to help in some way.

We don't know what this will look like. We don't know how it will turn out. (Yet that's what will make it fun!) (3)

Please plan to be at UUMAN on the evening of Dec 11 for the ritual of Chalica. It is my hope that this religious ritual will resonate with your values and your Unitarian Universalist faith.

Nurture our spirit. Strive for Justice. Transform the world.

In May 2021, NFCC opened the Barbara Duffy Center and immediately started serving clients and students in person with case management and ESL and GED education tracks. As we worked to establish those programs coming out of Covid, distancing but still following Covid safety guidelines, we learned a lot and have continued to serve many.

Now we are at a new juncture in our program and service development. We are going to offer employment and financial coaching to NFCC households starting January 2022. We have invested much time in discovering new tools and updated methodology which have been incorporated into an outstanding, relevant coaching orientation that will equip coaches with effective strategies to really offer a lasting opportunity for families to achieve stability.

Financial Coaching

NFCC will offer one-on-one financial coaching and peergroup workshops using a curriculum that includes: money values and goals, banking, credit reports and scores, making housing decisions, building and maintaining financial security.
