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Opening Back Up at UUMAN

Although we're not out of the woods yet, the Covid pandemic seems to be subsiding...for the

time being. We should be prepared for possible resurgences due to many no longer wearing masks or no longer observing social distancing. We also aren't absolutely certain about the effectiveness of the vaccines against the many variants or about how long the vaccines will protect us. We seem to be learning more each and every day, however.

Deprived of meeting in person since March of 2020, many of us are eager to return, open up, meet face to face, sing, dance, celebrate....ANYTHING! ("Can we come and dust inside Discovery Hall?" (**)

Although I would hazard to guess the most adult members of UUMAN have had both shots and almost all have had at least one, there are segments of our population, our youngest members, who are still unprotected.

UUMAN's Board established a team to assess the situation as it unfolds (based on public health data and science) and that team has posted our full safety guidelines on the front page of our website. (A one-page summary is also posted.) These guidelines outline what can be done inside and outside regarding UUMAN activities. As the situation on the ground continues to evolve day by day, hour by hour, it has been a daunting task for this team to keep up with the nuance and chang-

es. They are doing their very best in an effort to keep us ALL safe.

Although some might feel safe to return, meet indoors without masks or distancing (or whatever), I would ask that you respect the hard work that our all-volunteer team has done on our (& your) behalf.

Although Unitarian Universalists have a strong strain of individualism, we practice this in covenant with one another. How we return safely shouldn't be about how safe we feel individually but about how safe we feel in covenant. From a health perspective and from the perspective of covenant, a trusted advisor put it best, "this is public health, not individual risk."

Let us open back up at the speed of trust – at the speed of covenant.

Nurture our spirit. Strive for Justice. Transform the world.

How one of us has been able to continue going inside UUMAN this year...

Sometime last summer, we sat down with our then-ten-yearold, Olivia, to ask her how she's feeling about beginning her last year of elementary school. What should have been a year of big milestones and "lasts" was looking more like a year of continued unknowns, a bit of anxiety, and a lot of missed traditions. We had discussed how The Premo School

might be a good fit for Olivia pre-COVID, but last summer's conversation with her gave us an opportunity to look more seriously at the school. We spoke with Alashia Cody, director of the upper school, and visited shortly before the start of the school year. We were impressed with the steps they were taking to maximize distancing, minimize exposure, and maintain a caring, nurturing environment for the children. They'd been given permission by the UUMAN Board to utilize both Fellowship and Discovery Halls to allow the students more space when they were indoors. I am so happy to say that Olivia is—by the

time you are reading this—a rising sixth grader who is thriving, in large part because of her experience at Premo.

But this is all just the back story, and not all that I want to convey here. What is most important about our experience at Premo this past year is how much it aligns with our values as Unitarian Universalists. One of the first stories I heard after pickup one day began with a breathless question: "Mom, do we have any twine at home?" When I replied in the affirmative—and I mean VERY affirmative, given that I still had 980 feet of it left after using the mere 20 I needed the year before—she proceeded to tell me how she and several others were planning to build a bamboo platform up in a tree. The kids concocted the idea, provided their own supplies (no standing bamboo was harmed in the creation of said platform), and requested an adult to test it out before they stood on it. The kids worked together, they worked hard, they navigated through disagreements and negotiations, and they felt great pride when it was finished.

This experience reminded me so much of what I see in our children and youth at UUMAN—we make the conscious commitment each day to affirm how critical they are to our church and our faith. We provide a safe space for them to question, to experiment, to fail, to thrive, and this sets them up to be independent, conscientious, critical thinkers our

world so desperately needs.

Premo sees their responsibility as needing to educate the whole child, not just their mind. So they spend time outside in all sorts of weather, they include yoga in their weekly curriculum, and they compress the school week into four days to allow more time for kids to do what kids do best—learn through play and engage in the broader community.

When Olivia and I talked about this article, she asked me to be sure to include how welcoming Premo is to all of their students, regardless their gender identity, sexual orientation, or even hair color. She loves that her class size is so small (it ranged between 7-10 students throughout the year), and she

loves that families were able to go back and forth between virtual and in-person learning as they needed to during this pandemic. It meant that she didn't have to miss school if she had a sore throat but felt otherwise ok.

We won't be back at Premo next year—Olivia felt strongly that she wanted to at least start middle school in public school. She also asked if she could return to Premo if, for whatever reason, public school wasn't the best fit for her. We'd send her back in a heartbeat. I will be forever grateful to Premo for providing Olivia this year of stability and compassion in a most unstable year. And I am so proud that UUMAN has continued to offer its beautiful space to the Premo community—these two organizations fit each other so well.

Reflections from the President of the Board

About a year ago in the July 2020 newsletter I wrote about how "we are now living in very turbulent and stressful times". At that time, the number of deaths from the pandemic was at around 150,000 in the US. We are now at close to 588,000 confirmed deaths from COVID-19. A stunning figure for a country as wealthy and powerful as the US!

That article was also written soon after the murder of George Floyd at the hands of the police. Unfortunately, many other people of color have since died at the hands of police brutality. The good news, if there is any, is that it appears many in the US including white people have woken up to the systematic racism that exists in the US and are fighting for reform and justice. Our own congregation is now reading the book "The Sum of US – What Racism Costs Everyone and How We Can Prosper Together" by Heather McGhee, so that we can be better informed to act now.

When I wrote that article last summer it was not clear to anyone whether we would have a change in leadership in the White House and the Senate. Many said our democracy was hanging in the balance and it may very well have been. Are we out of the woods yet? I think not! There continue to be powerful voices in the US and our state that want to hold back change and continue to support racist and non-democratic policies and legislation which benefits the wealthy at the expense of low- and middle-income families of all races and ethnicities. We cannot let that happen.

On July 1 I will hand over the reins of the President of the Board to Jennifer Ratcliffe. I could not be happier as she is the right person at the right time – UUMAN is in good hands. I am also incredibly pleased to have Carla Kapeskas and Miriam Patanian joining the UUMAN Board in July, both bring experiences and gifts that everyone in the congregation will benefit from. I also want to thank the outgoing Board members, Todd Callen and Donna Melcher for their service and commitment to UUMAN. Their time and talent were truly a large gift to UUMAN!

In closing I would like to say that now is the time to double down on getting involved in our Mission and Vision! There are plenty of opportunities whether that is participating in Adult Education, helping with Religious Exploration, supporting our Family Promise commitment, or just pulling weeds in one our gardens, get engaged and help make a difference in our Congregation, Community and World. We can be successful in facing the challenges ahead if we stay focused and committed to our Mission and Vision. Let's get busy!
